Toxic plants and flowers, power cords, lit candles, and delicate sharp ornaments can become part of their diet as they explore these new toys and test them at their peril. Here are some pet friendly tips for keeping your furry friend safe at Christmas and [contact us](#) if you need us.

Secure your Christmas tree safely to the floor, wall or ceiling so it can't be tipped over. Use battery or solar operated candles to prevent fires. Decorate the home with shatterproof ornaments e.g. made from plastic, wood or paper. LED lights are cool to the touch, durable and energy efficient. If you are going out, unplug lights and other electronic decorations. If you have a real tree, the pine needles can be toxic to pets if chewed and consumed. And if you have cats, forget about the tinsel as ingesting this can result in costly surgery.

EAR INFECTIONS

If your pet is a bit irritable and scratching their ear a lot, they may have an ear infection. Try making an ear inspection part of your grooming routine. Be very gentle and clean the ear with a damp soft cloth and a solution made for specifically cleaning the ears. These can control the growth of organisms that can cause ear problems from swimming or humid air. Gently remove any seeds that may be in the ear, and check for redness or discharge. Don't push into the ear canal as it is a very delicate area and can damage your pets hearing. If your pet's ears are infected, bring them in [for treatment](#). We can help treat the infection and clear it up. Floppy eared pets are often more prone to infection in the moist inner ear.



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DENTAL CARE FOR PETS. 🌟🌟🌟🌟🌟🌟

Dental disease or periodontal disease is the inflammation of the teeth and gums caused by a build-up of plaque. But what is plaque? It is made up of food particles, saliva and bacteria that stick to the tooth surface and if not brushed away will calcify into tartar. Once it has calcified your best option is to bring your cat or dog into us for a scale and polish. Your pet will be sedated so that they don't stress or move about during the process. Once your pet's teeth are cleaned, then a daily brushing at home is all that is required to keep dental disease at bay. Never use human toothpaste for your pet as it is too strong and will upset their stomach. Special pet toothpastes have flavours such as chicken and beef which helps make the teeth brushing procedure more acceptable to pets. You can also get chew toys such as 'Kong' or 'Gumabone' that help keep their teeth healthy and clean. With any health issue, early detection is important as treatment is quicker and more effective in the early stages of a disease. Snail Bait Toxicity. Gardeners around the county are once again battling to keep the snails from munching away at their gardens. Snail bait is widely used and is very effective. Sadly, snail and slug bait are extremely toxic when ingested by our pets. A toxic compound called metaldehyde is the culprit. Dogs are notorious for getting into things they shouldn't, and snail bait in chewable pellets that are flavoured with molasses, apple and bran also attract our dogs. These formulations can also contain insecticides which make the product even more toxic to pets. Symptoms of snail bait poisoning include anxious behaviour with mild twitching, which progresses to uncontrollable muscle twitching, seizures and possibly death. Treatment requires possible induction of vomiting, IV fluid support, stomach pumping and enemas to help rid the toxin, and charcoal to help absorb any substance remaining in the body. If you suspect your pet has ingested snail bait, bring them immediately to us for assistance. Recovery depends on how much poison was eaten, and how quickly you can get them [veterinary assistance](#).
