Look after your pets as they may panic if they catch a whiff of the fire, and fear may cause them to run away and hide. Keep your pet's safe inside until you must evacuate, and give them plenty of reassurance. Plan and be prepared. Along with your personal items, plan an emergency bin for your pet needs. Medications, foods, contact phone numbers for yourself and your family and friends. A short bio on each pet stating their name, disabilities if any, medications, food intolerances, age, and personality. Make sure you include copies of their vaccinations in case they have to stay in a shelter for a short while. Collars, leash and harnesses, perhaps a favorite blanket and toy. Be ready if the wind changes and you must leave immediately. Put a harness on your cat too, as they may panic in the upheaval and escape from your arms.

Walking Your Dog

A front clip harness will help keep your dog from pulling. When you are out walking, remember dogs love to sniff, so allow a bit of time for Fido to wander a bit and 'read the newspaper'. 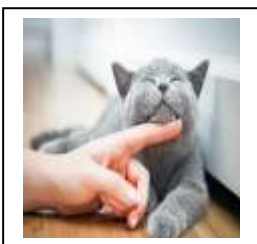
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Worming Your Dog & Cat– And Why It Is So Important

Internal deworming is important for the health of our pets. Owners who do not deworm their pets leave them exposed to infestations that can cause discomfort, diseases and even death. There is more than just one type of worm, you can have roundworm, heartworm, tapeworm, and whipworm. These parasites live inside your pet and have negative and potentially deadly effects. Puppies and kittens need to begin treatment even as young as two weeks of age. Adult animals require treatment every three months. Worms have a complex lifecycle and we have many strategies to deal with dealing with these parasites. It is important to maintain a routine worming treatment as worms are an ongoing battle . Not only will it protect your pet, but it will protect your family as children can become infected with certain dog and cat worms. Cancer of the Nose & Sinus in Cats. Often found in older cats, white cats or cats that are thin haired varieties, and especially those cats that love to sunbathe behind a window. The cancer often starts with black dots, which look harmless enough, but then the cells start to bind together becoming crusty and then it starts to eat away at the nose. Nasal tumors or cancer are most always malignant. They are not sex specific and occur in the nasal cavity or the frontal and paranasal sinuses. Aggressive treatment is required which is a combination of local radiation and systemic chemotherapy. As with any disease, the early you notice it and seek veterinary help the easier and more effective it is to treat.

Icy Treats for Cats and Dogs Both cats and dogs love tuna, and it is just as tasty when frozen. Freeze in small bite size mounds or even blend with a little yoghurt or egg before freezing. Not only will it keep them healthy, but it will be a cooling treat. Chicken or beef broth with no added salt mixed with water and frozen into ice blocks makes a refreshing snack for your cat or dog.



How to Remove a Tick from your pet.

Keep your pet calm and steady. It may help having a second person to hold and reassure your pet. Position your tweezers either side of the tick and grasp onto the tick as close to your pets' skin as possible, being careful not to pinch your pets' skin. Using steady even pressure, pull the tick straight out. Don't twist or jerk as you may leave part of the tick attached. Examine the tick to ensure the head and mouth are there. Kill the tick by placing it in a container with rubbing alcohol. Gently disinfect the bite site on your pet using triple antibiotic spray or wipes. Keep an eye on the site, and if it becomes red or inflamed, bring your dog immediately to us as ticks can cause some nasty health problems.

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
